
Year One of a Community-Driven **Species Recovery Effort**

Common Nighthawks are one of the fastest declining bird species in North America. Analysis of more than 20 years of data from the Bird Conservation Network show a **similar trend in the Chicago** region. In the summer of 2022, Chicago Ornithological Society launched a new volunteer monitoring program to track, study, and conserve Chicago's nighthawk population. The pilot season provided important lessons and insights for how to effectively monitor these birds and assess urban habitat needs.

Methods:

- Volunteer monitors selected 4 points to be monitored through the season
- Points could be at any location but must be at least 0.5 miles apart and away from noise pollution sources
- All 4 points were monitored once during each of 3 monitoring windows: June 12-18, June 19-25, June 26-July 2
- Monitoring was conducted as a 5 minute point count
- Any nighthawks seen or heard were recorded via eBird

Monitoring Numbers:

- 16 volunteer monitors
- 116 checklists submitted via eBird or site visits made
- 48 locations monitored, 26 had nighthawks detected
- 76 nighthawk detections




Figure 1: nighthawk occupancy compared to tree cover

Early Trends Emerging:

- Monitor experience level has little effect on detection rates
- Duration of monitoring past 5 minutes has little effect on detection rates
- Nighthawk presence positively correlates with increasing tree cover (figure 1)




Figure 2: nighthawk occupancy compared to housing density

- Nighthawk presence positively correlates with increasing housing density (figure 2)
